Yearly Grade Calculations: Beginning in Fall 2019, yearly grades are calculated with three trimesters averaged to equal a final grade for the year. Prior to Fall 2019, four quarter grades counted 20% each and two semester exams counted 10% each. Exam grades are not included on the transcript, but semester/trimester grades and final yearly grades are included.

GPA Calculation: GPA is based on a 4-point system. GPA is determined based upon the number of credits awarded for each class (similar to college systems). GPA is unweighted.

Class Rank: Due to selective enrollment and small class sizes, class rank is not meaningful. Cumulative numerical averages are used to determine the Valedictorian and Salutatorian of each graduating class. Our 2021 graduating class has 10 students.

Extracurricular Program

Athletics High school students, both boys and girls, participate in several sports through the

Texas Association of Private and Parochial Schools (TAPPS): Soccer, Cross Country,

Basketball, and Track & Field.

Clubs and Activities Students participate in Key Club, 4-H, TAPPS Speech & Academic Team, TAPPS

Service Opportunities All students participate in The BIG Serve, a yearly school-wide service project.

Also, high school students tutor/mentor elementary students through the school's House System, serve in Key Club, and serve independently in the community.

The House System

The House System at Regents Academy is reminiscent of the houses of the traditional residential college system. Students in 7th-12th grades are distributed into four houses, which serve as small, permanent, faculty-supported, cross-sectional, and human-friendly components. A faculty member oversees each house. Through weekly service projects, friendly competitions, and devotionals, and through connecting the Lower and Upper Schools, students develop character, strengthen community, and grow as leaders. The House System seeks to facilitate the creation and the passing on of school culture, make it easier for students to develop and deepen friendships, provide opportunities for student leadership, and enable students to create and steward school traditions.

Upperclassmen selected to participate in the Student Leadership Lab/SSL are given leadership roles and responsibilities in the House System, and are equipped and mentored in these roles so that they can then grow as leaders through experience. SSL is designed for seniors (or occasionally juniors) who have been chosen to be the House Stewards. The staff member directly responsible for overseeing these students is the House System Coordinator, who also receives support from school administrators and other faculty. Students who complete the course satisfactorily receive .5 credit on their high school transcript. The course is graded by means of a simple Pass/Fail.

The Omnibus

Our core humanities program is called the Omnibus, a Great Books course that integrates history, literature, writing, philosophy, and theology. The course consumes two periods of the student's day for all four years of high school and spans ancient, medieval, and modern time periods. The course is taught at or above honors level course work and emphasizes analytical thinking, interpretation of written texts, and written and oral expression. All students must complete this core curriculum. In addition, students also read classics and exemplary readings from an approved reading list.

Selected Readings

- Freshman Year/Modernity I: The Bible, The Westminster Confession of Faith, The Pilgrim's Progress, The Social Contract, Of Plymouth Plantation, Foundational American Documents (Declaration of Independence, Constitution, Bill of Rights, etc.), A Tale of Two Cities, Uncle Tom's Cabin, selected slave narratives, Speeches by Lincoln, Mein Kampf, The Communist Manifesto, Animal Farm.
- Sophomore Year/Antiquity II: The Bible, The Iliad, The Peloponnesian War by Thucydides, The Bacchae, The Republic, Nicomachean Ethics, selected Works of Cicero, Antony and Cleopatra, Apocrypha, Heroes of the City of Man.
- ❖ <u>Junior Year/Christendom II</u>: The Bible: Psalms, *City of God* by St. Augustine, *The Consolation of Philosophy* by Boethius, *The Divine Comedy, Paradise Lost, Othello*.
- Senior Year/Modernity II: The Bible, Pensées by Blaise Pascal, select readings from the Portable Enlightenment Reader, Les Misérables, select readings from Romantic Era Poets, Hamlet, Battle Cry of Freedom: The Civil War Era by James McPherson, Heart of Darkness, All Quiet on the Western Front by Erich Remarque, The Great Gatsby, Of Mice and Men, One Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich by Alexander Solzhenitsyn, The Waste Land by TS Elliot, Brave New World, select short stories by Flannery O'Connor.



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
